

## Documentaries

"13th" (2016) directed by Ava DuVernay - This documentary explores the 13th amendment of the U.S. Constitution and how it has been used to uphold discrimination and racial inequality throughout history.

"Unbelievable: The Story of Redlining" (2018) directed by Viola Davis and Julius Tennon - This documentary examines the history of redlining, a discriminatory practice in which banks and insurers refused to give loans and insurance to people living in neighborhoods deemed "high risk" due to their racial makeup.
